
JIM KEEPS OUR TECH HUMMING

Electronic devices and apps can link us to the world – but if not set up correctly, they can also be a source of endless frustration.

Jim Stevens has solved many technology problems for Eastside Village Members over recent years, bringing his sense of calm logic to the confusing tangle we can find ourselves in when trying to do something new.

He reboots, he explains, he sorts through multiple remotes and connections. And more often than not, he can pinpoint the exact problem a Member is having, getting them swiftly on their way to using a new computer, smartphone, or TV or even just getting their old one working again.

"There are a lot of technical terms with home electronics that



can intimidate people, but most things are pretty easy to use once you get past that," says Jim. "I really enjoy being able to help people keep technology working for them, and maybe learning how to use a few new bells and whistles."

Jim had a long professional career, but not in the high-tech field. He was a forester and forest economist, bringing his knowledge of environmental science and natural resources to various university, governmental, and private-sector jobs.

At the same time, he says, "I was always pretty comfortable with technology, and was an early adopter as new innovations came on the market."

He retired from forestry about 10 years ago. And when he started searching for volunteer opportunities, he learned about Eastside Village. He was attracted to the notion that simple problem-solving — provided by neighborhood volunteers — could make a big difference in people's day-today lives.

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lightbulbs. But once he started seeing requests for technology, he developed a reputation as one of the volunteer team's tech specialists.

"In most cases, the requests have a pretty simple fix," he says. "The alternative might be to call someone from a tech company or a big-box store to come out, but that can be cost-prohibitive and still might not solve the problem.

"They might be able to tell you your hardware is working fine, but you still have a setup problem with your streaming services and three different remotes. And all you want to do is watch PBS.

"I usually just start by looking at the bigger picture, and oftentimes can sort out things fairly quickly," he adds. "I can't always solve the problem, but it is satisfying when I can."

3. What are your interests? Which activities and/or groups do you plan to be active in?

I love to hike and walk. We live near Mt. Tabor and I go there to walk regularly. I love being able to hike right from my house. I've taken so many pictures of the tall trees around here. I may join EV's hiking group.

I also am interested in movies, reading, live theater, and the symphony. I listen to Audible. (I'm listening to "Horse" right now; it's an epic that weaves race relations through US history, from its founding to today.)

One of the many upgrades in the quality of our lives in Portland is that we can get to cultural events downtown in just 12 minutes—and find affordable parking!

Also, immediately before moving here, we lived in a seventh-floor condo in Evanston, a suburb just north of Chicago. Here, we live in a house, so I can garden again!! I even have to buy a shovel!

I'm so happy to have a small but sunny garden in our backyard. What a pleasure to plan for cultivating rhubarb, squash, and tomatoes!

1. How did you hear about Eastside Village? When did you join?

I especially appreciate the value of the Village to seniors, many of whom are living alone and don't have many opportunities to meet other people.



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3. What are your interests? Which activities and/or groups do you plan to be active in?

So far, I've gone to one of the Men's Luncheons. Claire and I are very interested in foreign relations and had hoped to attend Mary Beth's talk on Moldova, but our plans changed and we couldn't make it. I look forward to being much more involved.



I've also just started a new program for the Village, to help Members expand their vocabularies. I began studying words back in high school to improve my verbal scores on college entrance exams. I studied the book 30 Days to a More Powerful Vocabulary carefully and enrolled in my first choice: Cornell.

About 30 years ago, I was working as an environmental consultant and decided to offer co-workers the opportunity to build their vocabularies. Every week or so, I'd email them a list of six words with their definitions, pronunciation, and context. I've been sending the list to a growing number of people ever since.

Some of my readers send me words, too; I add them to the list if they're not too esoteric and I don't know the definition, I've been doing this since 1992 and have accumulated more than 3,000 words! If there are word lovers in the Village, let's discover words together!

Here's an example: sesquipedalian! My recent post on the EV Open Forum explains the etymology of this word.

4. How long have you lived in Portland?

As I said, we moved here this year. But we've been coming to Portland for many years because our son is a criminal defense attorney in private practice here.

LIVING WITH CHRONIC DISEASE AND/OR PAIN? EV HAS A NEW GROUP FOR YOU

A new Chronic Disease/Pain Support Group has started at Eastside Village. The Group meets every other Monday at 1:00-2:30 on Zoom and is facilitated by Laurie Hansley (living with Scleroderma), a trained Support Group leader with over twelve years of experience leading similar groups.

This Group hopes to support those of us who need coping strategies and understanding when dealing with the mental and physical challenges of a chronic illness.

For those of you not familiar with Support Groups, we are nonprofessional, peer-supported, and confidential. We understand that sharing health challenges can be intimidating and we provide a safe space where Group members can offer and receive understanding and shared personal experiences. It can be surprising and validating to hear how we have the same concerns and vulnerabilities!

Our format consists of a "check-in" with each Member and then discussion on topics suggested by Members. During the first meeting, we discussed COVID fears and its impact on us individually. Other topics may include asking for help, changing negative thought patterns, mindfulness, isolation, invisibility, worsening symptoms, compassion for ourselves, humor, tough choices, holidays, and anything else that we agree upon.

The only rules we ask are confidentiality and respect for the speaker. If you feel that this is something you might be interested in trying, please contact Laurie Hansley.
